Message from Felicia Willow, our interim CEO


Hello everyone!

Reaching out to BSL A family's journey in deafness

In 2010, Emma Denton and her husband, Matt, were about to walk on stage to perform in their string quartet, when they received some life-changing news.

They were both professional classical musicians, touring the UK and juggling demanding careers in music while raising their first child, Charlie and their new-born, Daisy.

Their son, Charlie had already been diagnosed as profoundly deaf.

Charlie was two and a half and Emma was told that he wouldn't hear a plane taking off close to him. That was a difficult diagnosis for a parent to hear but the news they were about to receive before walking on stage had a deeper, more profound impact.

At first I felt sad about Charlie's deafness, that we couldn't share our passion for music with our son, but then very quickly I told myself that this is not about me but about Charlie and so I went 'Tiger mum' and thought, what can I do to give him the best opportunities? So, my way of coping was to read up and gain as much information as I could. During this period, I also had a gut feeling that he had Usher's syndrome. Usher's Syndrome is a genetic condition that causes deafness from birth and sight loss in later life. He would struggle in sunlight and despite being really active as a toddler, he couldn't walk in a straight line and would fall over for no reason. This was dismissed by the medical professionals, but I kept pushing and he eventually got tested.

I was on tour, badgering them on the phone for the results and then just before going on stage, they told me. He had Usher's 1B – the most severe type. Then we walked out on stage to perform. Matt and I couldn't look at each other the whole performance because it was just so devastating.

Around that time there was an article in The Telegraph about Emma and her husband Matt as musicians and the reporter had picked up on the 'Tragic' story of musicians with a deaf child who was getting cochlear implants. After the article came out were sent a very nasty image from somebody of parents holding down a child and drilling into their head with the message 'This is what you are doing to your son!' It was a very difficult time. We were given no information at the time about Sign Language as an option and were quickly advised about cochlear implants, about fixing his deafness.

I remember the worst, most frustrating day I had as the parent of a deaf child, was when I was chasing Charlie around the front room trying to get the hearing aids on, and him screaming at me. The reality of realising that my own child is running away from me, screaming, struck me. I realised at the time that that is not a natural way for us to be and just simply gave up.

For a time, Charlie was a little angry whirlwind of emotions, and it was all because he was frustrated that he couldn't communicate. But there was never a conversation with me from professionals about him learning sign language or at least including sign language in with his general language learning. Instead, we were given a bunch of glossy leaflets about which brand of cochlear implant to get. We were also worried about if Charlie loses his eyesight, then how would he understand sign language, not knowing or being told anything about

Looking back, the shocking thing was the lack of information. I remember Charlie being so frustrated with communication that he would hit his head against the wall and I'd have to hold him until he calmed down. If only we'd been offered a different way of communicating, that might have been different but there was never a time when we were presented with any other option. It was like a snowball effect where one thing led to another, and we never really were allowed the time to pause and rationally think about other options.

We began to think about sign language while we were on a family holiday and Charlie and Daisy were in the sea the whole time. He preferred not to risk his implants in the water but we needed a way of communicating with him. There was also moments at home, in the mornings when he wasn't wearing them. So, we began to think about learning sign language. We reached out to find some classes but at the time there was a shortage of BSL classes and teachers.

Despite some of the stresses and decisions faced by his parents, Charlie grew into a confident and positive child, taking a keen interest in sports and making good friends at school.

For Charlie, going to a mainstream school, he was surrounded by hearing friends and never really had the opportunity to meet other deaf people. He's had some struggles with his identity as a result, not knowing where he really fits in.

Now that Charlie has joined Deaf tennis, he's suddenly met with other people who get it. He just feels a lot more comfortable, if he's sharing a room with another cochlear implant user, he doesn't need to explain anything. At school he sometimes misses out on things that the other boys talk about, even things like swear words! So, I've had to have a few very odd conversations with him where I need to explain things that really, if he was among other deaf boys, his friends would have explained to him. So, it's great that he now has peers that he can totally relate to at tennis. It's been life changing for Charlie – given him so many opportunities. When he met Deaf BSL users, it triggered something in him.

Since becoming an ambassador for Deaf Sports, he's become so interested in sign language. He loves his cochlear implants but it's become really important to him to understand that there's a whole Deaf community out there that he wasn't part of and he wants to become connected with that. But there's also a guilt there from the cochlear generation. He wants to fit in with the BSL users but feels that sometimes the BSL users are offended by him. I try to explain to him that there's strong feelings there but it's not personal. It's nothing to do with him as a person but he's left with a feeling that he doesn't always fit in in the hearing world, but he also doesn't quite fit into the deaf world. So, Charlie has started to want to learn sign language.

My mum had always wanted to learn it. She's been supporting us all the way, looking after Charlie as a small child. She understood that on those occasions where Charlie doesn't have his implant on, like first thing in the morning, she needed a way of communicating with him so she was keen to start learning with Charlie. Charlie's sister, Daisy was also desperate to learn and so at a huge cost, four of us, three generations of the family all began learning at the same time. So, we completed our level 1 as a family.

For Charlie, he made a really strong connection to William, the teacher and it was because William understood him. There was a really nice bond and I think he realised he could click with a Deaf BSL user for the first time and that made him really feel at home. I could see him growing in confidence with his BSL and that has fired him up to learning more.

Then we began level 2, but Charlie was doing his GCSE's so he had to hold off for a year. Granny didn't do it last year, so she could join him this September. So, Daisy and I did Level 2 and passed it! We use it all the time at home, especially every morning before he wears his implants. This coming September Charlie and his Gran will be doing level 2 and Daisy and I want to move onto level 3! However, the costs increase as you go up the levels and are huge so we're going to have to consider if we can afford to carry on.

The bill for all of us to continue in September is around £4,500 and when you look at what we've paid already, it will be £8500 in total. It's a real shame that this isn't provided for free for families with deaf members in them. We'd love to carry on but we're seriously going to struggle to afford that.

Charlie loves being deaf. He takes his implants out and the silence he experiences is a really sacred time for him. He also sees that actually his deafness has opened opportunities for him. It gives him a unique perspective and he wants to grab all of the opportunities presented. He's turned out to be a really good communicator and will be brutally honest with us about his feelings. He's a positive spirit, and I love his determination to keep reaching out to expand his experience of what being Deaf really means.

Can you help Natasha get to the Deaf World Cup? Meet Natasha Hamm from Coleford in the Forest of Dean. Natasha is

training hard for a 'dream come true' after being selected for the England Deaf World Cup Squad to play in The Deaf World Cup Finals in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Natasha, 33, a cleaner from Coleford said she was "so excited" to be selected for the World Cup Squad. She started playing at the age of 14 with Ross Town Ladies and despite past injuries has proven herself enough for the Deaf Women's management team to invite her into the national squad. Now the World Cup beckons but it's not an easy ask. Natasha works as a cleaner at the Suntory factory in Coleford in the mornings and at the Forest of Dean District Council offices in the evening. She also has a fitness regime at home to help build her stamina. She said: "I have two jobs and I do a lot of walking around. "I come home and do another 40 minutes on my overall fitness."

Apart from training, the biggest hurdle to overcome is that she needs to cover her own travel and expenses to get to the world cup. She is trying to raise £300.

Captioned performances Where can I go?

Our staff member and Hard of Hearing Champion, Kat Taylor has investigated Gloucestershire venues to see what they have to offer. Here's what she found.

Everyman Theatre, Cheltenham

Audio described, sign language interpreted and captioned performances are available. Individual show pages within the site will display symbols when these services are available.

They have a sound enhancement system. Using a headset (with or without a hearing aid) you can boost the volume of the performance. Ask their ushers for your headset.

Please note: this is not a loop system, it is an infra-red system. In order to use the infra-red hearing system whilst wearing a hearing aid you will need to have a T-setting on your hearing aid. If you are not sure, please speak to your audiologist prior to your visit to the theatre. Without a T-setting your hearing aid will not be able to connect to the infra-red system.

Top tips for enhancing your visit if you are hard of hearing:

- Book a seat close to the front. Hearing aids lose their effectiveness beyond a certain distance so the closer you are to the stage, the better the experience
- If using one of our headsets (either with or without a hearing aid) ensure that it's not covered by any clothing (e.g. a scarf) so as not to block the infra-red signal

CAPTIONED PERFORMANCES

Captions are similar to television subtitles. The actors' words appear on display units, placed on either side of the stage, at the same time as they are spoken or sung. Speaker names, sound effects and offstage noises are also shown as text. Audience members for captioned performances can sit where they prefer, however centre/side Circle or centre/side Stalls are recommended.

Cheltenham Town Hall

If the event has a disabled concession it will extend to people with hearing loss. Usually though the events have the 'disabled' person paying the full price and the carer gets in for free. The Access card

What is the Access Card?

Information, Evidence, Discounts and Opportunities for Disabled People

The Access Card (sometimes referred to as the CredAbility Card or a Nimbus Card) is a card like no other; we translate your disability/impairment into symbols that highlight the barriers you face and the reasonable adjustments you might need.

Think of it as a Disability Passport.

This then informs providers quickly and discreetly about the support you need and may gain you access to things like concessionary ticket prices and complex reasonable adjustments without having to go into loads of personal detail.

It's all based on your rights under the Equality Act and providers' responsibilities. Cost: £15 for 3 years.

Introducing Sam Ivins

When staff at GDA saw Sam's beautiful hand-crafted bowls at our Christmas Fair, we had to find out more about him. We met with Sam and his PA Rosemary Morgan, to find out more.

Sam is deaf with additional learning needs and has known GDA since his days as a teenager, attending GDYZ. Rosemary has been a friend of GDA since the late 90s when she first started learing BSL.

Sam first caught the woodworking bug while attending Hartpury College and then took this on further for his Duke of Edinburgh award.

"Its something that makes me very happy ...working with wood." For Rosemary, who has worked with Sam since his days at Hartpury College, Sam's development has been remarkable. "He's still a man of very few words but compared to the quiet young man I first met back in Hartpury College, I've seen him constantly growing in confidence and skills. For me its been wonderful seeing the potential that I've always known was there, actually come out."



Sam is particularly proud of his Gold Achievement in the Duke of Edinburgh award. The award was demanding, with physical elements, skills sections an expedition and hours of volunteering. Sam had to undertake sessions at Gloucester Athletics, the gym and some park runs and was just



about to start volunteering at *Parkrun* when the pandemic struck. It was very isolating and Sam struggled. It was during this period, when contact with Rosemary was limited that Sam found particularly difficult. However it was there, stuck at home that he continued pursuing his love with woodwork.

As we take the photograph, Sam handles his certificate with great care. He was awarded it by Prince Edward, the Duke of Edinburgh himself in London along with Rosemary. You can tell it means a great deal to Sam. In total, in order to achieve the Gold DofE award, Sam undertook 18 months of work through the pandemic and beyond. His expedition included camping and hiking every day. It's a great achievement.

Since his DofE award, Sam is particularly keen on woodturning and has a small lathe in his Dad's garage. He has made all sorts of things, including a beautiful striped rolling pin made up of different layers of dark and light wood. He has made 10 park benches at Viney Hill that he researched the design for himself.

Sam is currently selling his work at craft fairs. He makes his bowls at a lathe in Oaklands but he's looking for a 'men's shed' in the Forest of Dean that he can use so he can work more days on his craft. Most of his woodwork is made up of scrap wood, including the benches he made that were made up of old pallets.

Sam is looking to sell his work at summer fairs this year, expanding the number of stalls he sells on. He's looking to sell online but wants to make sure that he can make the work he's interested in. "Everything that Sam makes is absolutely unique." Rosemary says with a grin. He's certainly an artisan and we think that Sam is pretty unique himself. Good luck to him and a huge


